Objectives

Ensure the curriculum provides appropriate activities and experiences for pupils to develop our aims and meet national requirements and targets.

Develop resources, materials and approaches which fulfil our aim to provide stimulating and challenging teaching and learning materials for all pupils.

Evaluate these resources, materials and approaches which enable provision of stimulating and challenging teaching.

Provide positive reinforcement through clear and fair discipline and recognising and rewarding pupils' efforts and achievements.

Evaluate (and change where necessary) the organisational practices of the school in helping staff and pupils to achieve their aims.

Admission to Year 7

Admission to RMGS is by tests administered by Medway Council. The Medway tests comprise a Mathematics test, a Verbal Reasoning test and an Extended Writing exercise, and are taken by pupils in September in Year 6 preceding admission in the following September. For full details see Medway’s booklet ‘Admission to Secondary School – September 2019’.

As a result of the tests children will be deemed either selective or non-selective. Places will be offered first to any selective child with an Education Health Care Plan (EHCP) of special educational need where Rainham Mark Grammar School is named.

Oversubscription criteria for September 2019. If the number of RMGS preferences received, via the Medway Coordinated Scheme, from parents of children achieving selective standard exceeds the number of places available; places will be allocated in the following priority order.

(i) Children in Public Care, as defined in the Medway Coordinated Admissions Scheme to include children who are adopted and were previously looked after.

(ii) Children who are designated as receiving ‘Free School Meals’ on the qualifying date of 31 October 2018. Applicants under this criteria must complete a Supplementary Information Form so that checks can be made to determine eligibility.

(iii) Children who at the time of application have a brother or sister (including children living as siblings in the same family unit) on the roll of the school at the time of the sibling’s admission.

(iv) Child’s health reasons, supported by medical evidence, which requires the child to attend this school.

(v) Children who at the time of application attend a primary school within the Rainham Mark Education Trust (RMET).

(vi) Children who at the time of application have a parent who is a member of staff at the school (where the member

of staff has been employed for three years or more at the time at which the application is made and/or where the member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage).
(vii) Nearest of children's homes.

Distance will be measured by the shortest available safe walking route between home and school as measured by Medway Council's GIS. Those living closer to the school will receive the highest priority. Medway Council's GIS measures the start point, end point and distance of each route.

In the event of two or more children having equal ranking for the last place the deciding factor will be the shortest available safe walking distance between the home address and the school as measured by the Medway Council's GIS. Where this cannot be determined, the available place(s) will be allocated by drawing lots.

Tours of the school during a working day can be taken at 9.15am, 11.15am and 2.00pm from Monday 15 October 2018 to Friday 19 October 2018. We are unable to offer additional tours after 19 October 2018. Please contact the school to make an appointment.

Applying for a place in Year 7

If your child is at a MEDWAY primary school: Apply online or fill in the SCAF form found at the back of Medway's Booklet 'Admission to Secondary School' with RMGS named as a preference and return it to your child's primary school by 31 October 2018.

If your child is at a KENT primary school: fill in the form in Kent's Secondary Transfer booklet with RMGS named as a preference.

If your child is at school in any other area: please contact Medway Council for their booklet by writing to Admissions Team, Medway Council, Gun Wharf, Dock Road, Chatham, Kent ME4 4TR or by telephoning Student Services Admissions Team on 01634 331110.

For entry to Year 7 in September 2019, the Published Admission Number (PAN) is 205, but the Governors plan to admit 235 – a number already agreed with the Local Authority.

Travel costs to and from school

In some circumstances Medway may help with transport to schools. For further details see Medway's booklet 'Admission to Secondary School'.

Religious affiliations

The school has no religious affiliations in any formal sense: very occasional visits on an inter-denominational basis by local ministers and use of local churches for educational visits are the only connections. Acts of worship are broadly Christian and within the spirit of the 1988 Education Act. As far as possible these are held daily, within assemblies, for all children not withdrawn.

If you ask us to withdraw children from acts of worship or tuition we do that without query. Otherwise, unless a parent so requests, no child is treated differently from another because of religion, race or sex.

Our policy on sex education and relationships

Our sex and relationships education follows the changes and the guidance offered in the Children and Social Work Act 2017 on sex and relationships education.

It is taught as part of the Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) programme and the different aspects are introduced at times suitable for our students' physical and emotional development from Year 7 to Sixth form. This is taught by members of staff who are alert to the sensitive nature of the subject. Parents are entitled to withdraw pupils from these lessons.

We aim to provide full, honest information about the physical, emotional and social aspects of human sexual development from conception to old age, including the nature of love, personal relationships and family life. Students are encouraged to make informed decisions and to determine their own values within a moral framework. A more detailed statement is available on request.

Citizenship

Citizenship Education is delivered across the curriculum in a wide variety of subjects and also through our pastoral work and out of school activities. Students in Years 8 and 9 receive regular citizenship lessons as part of the PSHE course.

Complaints

Parents are invited to discuss any complaint first informally with the Headteacher or other senior staff. A parent not then satisfied can still take a complaint formally to a panel of Governors which has been established.

School clothing

Boys

- Black blazer with school badge and house flash
- Dark grey/Black trousers
- Plain White shirt (not polo shirt)
- School tie (clip on)
- Black or dark grey socks
- Black leather upper shoes (not boots, trainers or sandals)
- (Optional) V-necked pullover with double red stripe around the collar (which must be purchased from Rainham Sports or School-Time). (Grey pullover for Years 7 – 9, Black pullover for Years 10 and 11). No other pullover is allowed

Girls

- Black blazer with school badge and house flash
- Mid/dark grey skirt (pleated from the waist) OR Dark grey/black trousers (which must be purchased from Rainham Sports or School Time)
- Plain white revere-neck blouse
- White ankle socks or black tights with a skirt, black socks with trousers
- Black leather upper shoes (not boots, trainers or sandals)
- (Optional) V-necked pullover with double red stripe around the collar (which must be purchased from Rainham Sports or School-

Time). (Grey pullover for Years 7 – 9, Black pullover for Years 10 and 11). No other pullover is allowed

For Physical Education – all students will need the following:

- Plain red polo shirt (breathable)
- Plain red sweatshirt or with logo from School Time
- Plain black shorts (**not cycle shorts**), leggings, jogging or tracksuit bottoms
- White short socks
- Long red football socks
- Predominantly white trainers for all activities
- Plain black thermal base layer (advisable)
- Shin pads & Football boots (purchase these as advised by PE staff)
- A towel (optional)
- Please provide white plimsolls for gym/dance if your child has a foot infection (not trainers), otherwise bare feet

Boys and Girls

If an outer garment is worn it should be single dark colour coat (not denim, suede or leather). A plain black scarf (in cold weather).

Cardigans are not school uniform. Hooded sweatshirts (“hoodies”) are not an acceptable alternative to either pullovers or outer garments in place of a coat. School bags need to be large enough to carry a number of A4 size folders and textbooks. They must not be deemed a handbag and should not be a drawstring bag unless used for PE kit.

Jewellery: The only items of jewellery to be worn in school are plain gold or silver studs (one in each ear lobe) and a watch. These items must be removed for PE and games. No body piercings are allowed.

Make-up and nail varnish is not permitted in school.

Full uniform must be worn to and from school as well as in school.

Availability of documents

Copies of documents are held in a public file at the school office; photocopies will be made at cost-price on request.

Equal opportunities policy

RMGS is committed to the principle of opportunity for all pupils irrespective of gender, race or disability. RMGS aims to be a community within which everyone feels secure. The school is opposed to bullying, abuse, and harassment of any kind. It makes it clear to pupils that:

- no one should have to suffer sexist, racist, homophobic or other abuse
- no one should have to suffer name calling
- no one should have to fear or suffer physical violence
- no one should feel victimised in any way
- it is every pupil's responsibility to ensure that harassment is not tolerated

The motto for pupils is - **if there is a problem share it.**

Reports of bullying or hurtful behaviour will be recorded and followed up. The information will be passed on to the Head of Year who will interview those involved and take the necessary action. **The school believes that a pupil must not hit, threaten, harass or set out to make any pupil unhappy – especially a younger one.** This rests on the belief that older pupils in the school have a responsibility towards those younger than themselves. Any proven breach of this rule will result in a temporary exclusion. However, the school will take seriously a complaint from an older student that there is incitement, teasing, bullying from students from a lower year and will deal very firmly with that.

Disability and Special Needs Policy

The Governing Body and the Headteacher are committed to providing for pupils who have learning difficulties and/or disabilities and to developing cultures, policies and practices which are inclusive. With the right training, strategies and support, many pupils with additional educational needs can be successfully included in mainstream education.

We have in place sophisticated systems to identify barriers to learning and participation, and to provide for pupils throughout the learning spectrum. A dedicated Governor has responsibility for the School's Special Educational Needs (SEN) provision. He/she is supported by a Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO), an Inclusion Manager and Learning Support Assistants (LSAs), to work with pupils who need some additional help.

We have produced a full disability access plan which will ensure that we will not treat disabled pupils less favourably for a reason related to disability and we will take reasonable steps to ensure that disabled pupils are not placed at a substantial disadvantage compared to their non-disabled peers.

When changes have been made to the physical environment, we have tried to make provision for those with disabilities. For example, the provision of specialised toilet facilities serves the needs of pupils with severe medical difficulties.

All staff receive appropriate training, support and guidance in meeting their SEN responsibilities to their pupils.

Governing body's policy for school activities

RMGS policy is to pay for activities and visits through parental contributions to the School Fund. Obviously we cannot compel you to pay towards visits and we would certainly not treat your child differently according to whether you could or would contribute. But if many parents opted not to pay and/or refused permission for their child to attend, we would have to cancel the project. We invite any parent who has difficulty in paying to let us know: we can usually help. For pupils who claim free school meals, all curriculum related visits and field courses are free.
