<p>Magnificent, self-assured, wise, royal, ideal image of a king, chivalric, powerful, moral (did no wrong), saviour of England, great, heroic</p>	<p>Lustful, greedy, dishonest, unscrupulous, feared, intimidator, gross, arbitrary, tyrant, egotist, destructive, despotic, manipulative, disloyal</p>	<p>Inconsistent, sexually insecure, fragile, intolerant, gullible, malleable, weak, confused, conflicted (between 'jurisdictional radicalism' and 'sacramental conservatism')</p>	<p>Steadfast, loyal, tolerant, consistent</p>	<p>Believed in supremacy of laws, acted within limits, respect for parliamentary laws, not despotic, <u>overviewed</u> Cromwell's radical modernisation of govt. → unified State under a single ruler (giving HVIII greater legal authority than any previous monarch)</p>	<p>Egotist, determined to have his way, ruthless when crossed, expedient, morally convinced of the justice and rectitude of his methods (used Cromwell to attain his aims), intelligent, arrogant, self-centred, self-righteous, irascible,</p>
