CURRICULUM INTENT

By the end of the A Level course, Sociology students should have an in-depth critical understanding of sociological theories, perspectives and methods. The central focus of study is on UK society today, with consideration given to comparative dimensions where relevant, including the siting of UK society within its globalised context. Students will apply the integral core themes of socialisation/culture/identity and social differentiation/power/stratification to particular substantive areas of Sociology: Education, Crime and Deviance plus two additional optional areas. The two topics are Culture and Identity (Year 12) plus Stratification and Differentiation (Year 13). Students should understand the significance of conflict and consensus, social structure and social action, and the role of values. Students should have knowledge of the design of the research method(s) used to obtain the data under consideration, including their strengths and limitations.
